PART 3: Write Your Own Portal Story!

Your story must include:

- **Three characters** (you and two friends)

- A world that seems the same at first—but something big is different
- How your characters react, what they discover, and what they decide to do next

Tips for Writing:

- Start with an exciting or mysterious beginning
- Show how the characters feel through their words and actions
- Build suspense and surprise in the middle
- End with a twist or a tough decision

PART 1: Comprehension Check – Answer Key

Encourage complete sentences, but here are concise expected answers:

- 1. Who are the main characters in the story, and what are they doing in the forest?**
 - Jake, Marcus, and Sofia are the main characters. They are exploring the forest behind Jake's neighborhood when they find a strange blue portal.
- 2. How do the kids react to the portal, and what does that show about their personalities?**
 - Jake is bold and curious—he throws a stick and wants to go in. Marcus is cautious but interested, and Sofia is surprised and unsure. Their reactions show that Jake takes the lead, Marcus thinks carefully, and Sofia is observant but hesitant.
- 3. What changes after Jake, Marcus, and Sofia go through the portal?**
 - Everything looks the same at first, but the portal turns red, and later they realize their neighborhood and Jake's house are different.
- 4. Why is Jake shocked when he sees his dad?**
 - His dad looks the same, but doesn't recognize him and says he doesn't have a son.
- 5. What clues show that the kids are no longer in the same version of their world?**
 - Jake's house looks different, his father doesn't recognize him, the neighbors' homes have changed, and unfamiliar technology (like a strange drone) is in the sky.

PART 2: Critical Thinking – Teacher Notes & Sample Responses

Goal: These questions are open-ended and meant to develop reasoning. Use them for discussion or written assessment.

1. What do you think happened to the original version of Jake’s father?

Sample Answer:

Maybe he’s still in their real world, and the man they met is from an alternate reality where Jake doesn’t exist. It could be that in this world, Jake was never born or moved away.

2. Should the kids go back through the red portal? Why or why not?

Sample Answer:

Yes, because it might be their only way to return home. The red portal might be a clue that the path works both ways. On the other hand, it could be risky—maybe it leads somewhere worse.

Tips for grading: Look for:

- Evidence of reasoning
- Creative but grounded thinking
- Reference to story details or personal application

Objectives: Narrative development, use of descriptive language, originality, and basic structure.

Tips for Support:

- Allow peer brainstorming
- Offer portal-themed story starters or visual prompts
- Use a checklist for story parts (beginning, middle, end)

Differentiation Strategies for Teaching “The Portal in the Pines” Assignment

1. Differentiate by Readiness (Skill Level)

Support for Struggling Readers/Writers:

- Provide a **read-aloud** or **audio version** of the story
- Highlight or pre-teach **key vocabulary** (e.g., portal, version, shimmer, formal, recognize)
- Use **sentence frames** for Part 2 and Part 3 (e.g., “I think the red portal means _____ because...”)
- Offer a **guided group brainstorm** before writing
- Break writing tasks into **step-by-step checkpoints** with examples

Challenge for Advanced Students:

- Ask them to write an **alternate ending** or **prequel**
- Add a twist: What if only **one** character remembered the real world?
- Encourage use of **figurative language, dialogue**, or a subplot
- Extend Part 2 with research: “Are parallel universes possible in science?”

Optional Extension Ideas:

- **Class discussion:** What makes a “home”? How would you prove who you are?
- **STEM tie-in:** Create a fictional explanation for how the portal works.
- **Art project:** Draw two different versions of the same location (before and after the portal).

Tier: A mix of Tier 2 and Tier 3 vocabulary (general academic and story-specific)

Word	Student-Friendly Definition	Example Sentence
dense	Packed closely together; thick and hard to see through	The forest was so dense they could barely walk between the trees.
faint	Very light or weak; barely noticeable	A faint glow was coming from behind the trees.
glow	A soft, steady light	The portal gave off a quiet, blue glow.
pulsing	Moving in and out or getting brighter and dimmer, like a heartbeat	The light was pulsing, like it was alive.
cluster	A group of similar things that are close together	A cluster of pine trees blocked their view.
shimmering	Shining with a soft, wavy light	The shimmering portal looked like rippling water.
portal	A magical or science-fiction doorway that leads to another place or world	They stepped through the glowing portal without knowing where it led.
vanished	Disappeared completely	The stick vanished as soon as it went through the portal.
sensation	A feeling or experience through the senses (touch, sight, etc.)	Walking through the portal gave them a strange sensation.
uneasy	Uncomfortable or worried; not feeling right	They exchanged uneasy glances before knocking on the door.

formal	More proper or serious than usual	Jake's dad looked formal, like someone at a business meeting.
snapped	Spoke in a sharp or angry way	"I don't know you," the man snapped.
stunned	Too shocked or surprised to speak or move	The kids stood there, stunned by what just happened.
version	A different form or type of something	Marcus wondered if they were in another version of their world.
illusion	An illusion is something that tricks your brain into seeing, hearing, or believing something that isn't really true	Sofia asked if the portal was an illusion.
drone	A small flying machine that can be controlled remotely	A strange drone flew overhead in the sky.
